Judge Nash graduated from New Hampton School at the age of 16, and from Dartmouth College in 1842. He returned to NHS to teach the classics. Though Judge Nash passed away before the library doors opened in 1896, his legacy has generously contributed education, literature, history, and a place of community to the lives of many visitors. The Historical Society's Programs are presented at the library.

The 2024 Summer Theme for the Historical Society's Museum is "New Hampton Industry" featuring the New Hampton Fish Hatchery.
